Symposium:

Symposium on Landscape and Regeneration, 24 and 25 October, 2008, led by the History of Gardens and Landscapes Seminar at the IHR, with support from English Heritage, and in association with the Garden History Society.

In our search for the landscapes of the past, we sometimes overlook the importance of today's green landscapes in their role as catalysts for regenerating forgotten and down-at-heel settlements. Whether worked-out industrial sites, waterfronts whose manufacturing or boat-building activities have long since disappeared, or once- thriving urban areas that have lost their economic raison d'être, a number of noteworthy developments are unfolding to try to regenerate these areas. The most recent ones are closely linked to sustainability and the amelioration of global warming. Speakers will include academics and professional practitioners of landscape-making. Topics will include Piet Oudolf's Millennium Park in Chicago, the revival of the Royal Gardeners' training school in Berlin, garden tourism and its work in resuscitating rural areas, the role of the Olympic Park, and the transformation of the Emscher valley's industrial landscape. Speakers include David Lambert, Ken Worpole, Isabelle Van Groeningen, and Hazel Conway.
